


Teacher Input Suggestions

- Correlate your reading to the topic of Fables. For example: James Raves' "Fables from Aesop"; Untermeyers' "Aesop's Fables"; Joseph Jacobs' "The Fables of Aesop"; Arnold Lobel's "Fables" (a must!).
- Read one of Lobel's fables orally to the class each day.
- Show Moreland-Latchford's Sound Filmstrips "Fabulous Fables".
- 4. Show videos of Aesop's fables.
- Construct life-size paper maché models of the animals in Aesop's fables.
- 6. Act out roles of characters in Aesop's fables.
- Make a mural resembling a jig-saw puzzle. Take a
 piece of brown mural paper. Using a pencil divide it
 into as many pieces as you have students.

If you cannot get something, it is easy to say it is no good.

FABLES

Each piece does not have to be equal in size. Cut out pieces and distribute. Have students illustrate scenes from Aesop's fables. Assemble pieces and display the completed mural.



- Mime the actions and facial expressions to "tell" the fables without speaking.
- Set up a fable mini-center in a corner of your classroom. Have students decorate your mini-center with clay models or dioramas of the scenes in various fables.
- Make a fable word mobile. Draw and cut out pictures
 of animals found in Aesop's fables. Tie a word card
 under each animal (a word that is usually associated
 with that animal e.g. sly fox).

Do not let anyone turn you from your purpose.
