

All Alone

What if you had no home. What if there was no place to call home. And there was no one you could talk to about home. You couldn't say, "Where I come from it snows in the winter." Or, "I'm going home now." You just couldn't say these things. No one would listen to you. And everyone you met would know that you no longer had a home.

Oh, I don't mean just the street you live on, or the state you live in, like New York. I mean your country. I mean the United States of America. What if the United States was taken away from you. What if you had no country.

What if the President said you must leave the United States. He has you taken and put on a ship. The ship's captain is told never to bring you back to America. When the captain has to return with his ship, he puts you on another ship that goes out again. And it's always like that. You go from one ship to another. You never come home again. You have no home.

You are always with people you don't know. They are told not to talk about home around you.

You remember things about home. But no one will let you talk about them. If you try, they will walk away. You remember swimming in the summer. You remember taking walks in the winter woods. And riding horses and having picnics on a hot summer day. You remember parades and watching the flag as it went by. You remember reading about George Washington and Abraham Lincoln. But no one will talk to you about these things. It's like a bad dream.

Can you picture it? You are on a ship that goes out to sea. You don't belong anywhere. No one really has anything to do with you. No one really cares about you. You are not wanted in any other country. Not in Canada, Mexico, England, France, or Italy. Not anywhere! When you are not looking, people look at you and shake their heads. They never thought they would

see someone without a country.

What must they think? What very, very bad thing could you have done? Why would your country be taken away from you? Everyone who looks at you wonders. How does it make you feel not to belong? Do you feel bad? Do you feel alone? Do you find that it's hard to talk? Do you hide from people?

Everyone you see wonders what you did. By and by, the word gets out. But you move from ship to ship and people stop thinking about you. But some, like me, do remember. We remember your country was taken away from you because you didn't love it. A long time ago, that happened to a man I knew.
