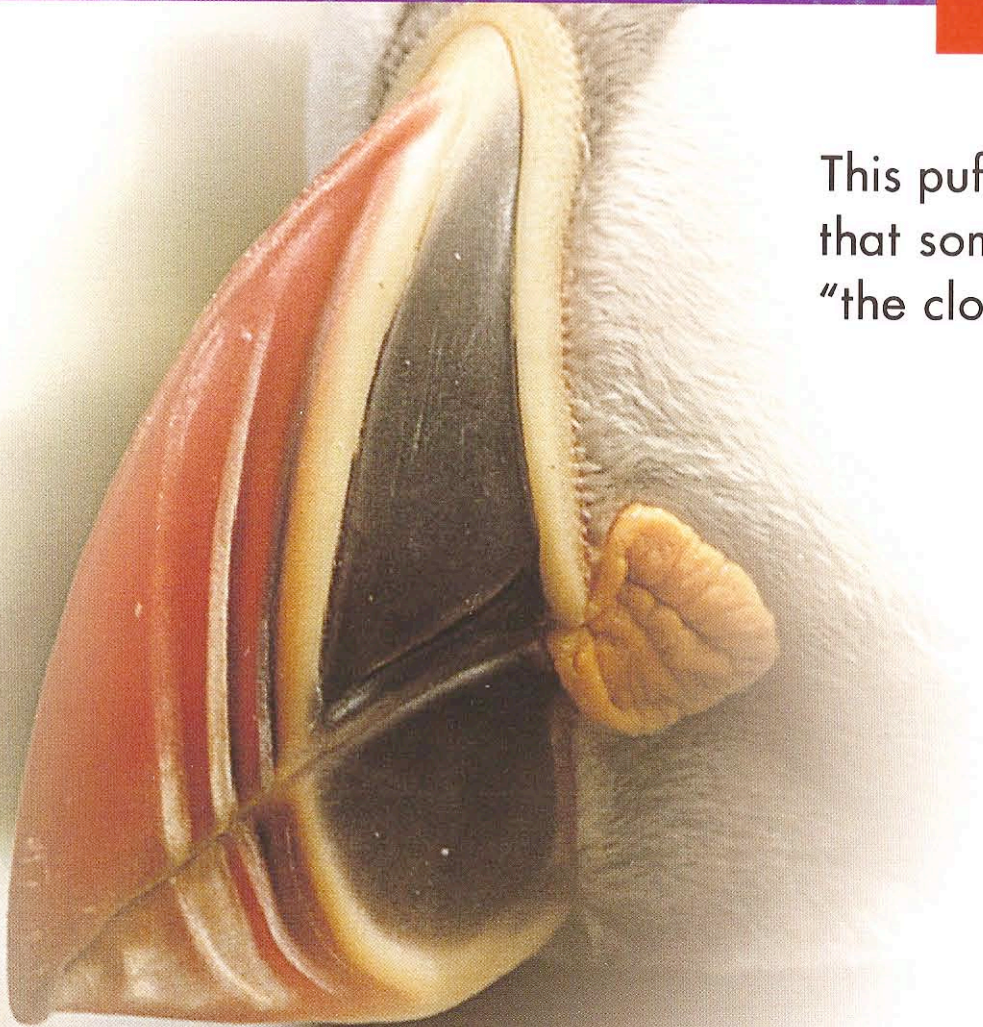


LOOK ONCE

This puffy beak belongs to a bird that some people call "the clown of the sea."



LOOK AGAIN

Puffins dive deep and catch fish with their beaks.

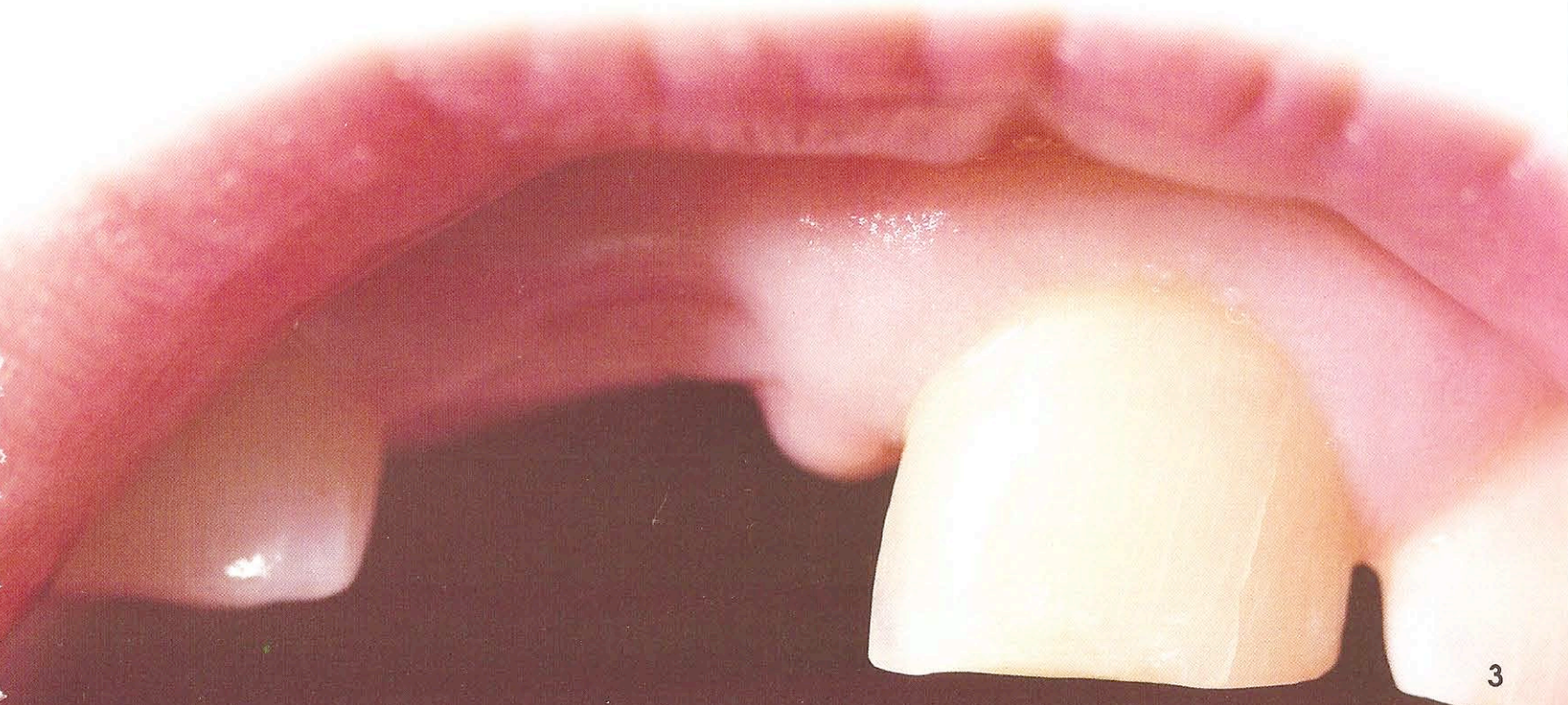
A puffin can hold up to 30 fish in its beak at one time. It will feed some of the fish to its young. A puffin chick will eat more than 2,000 fish before it can catch fish for itself.

LOOK ONCE

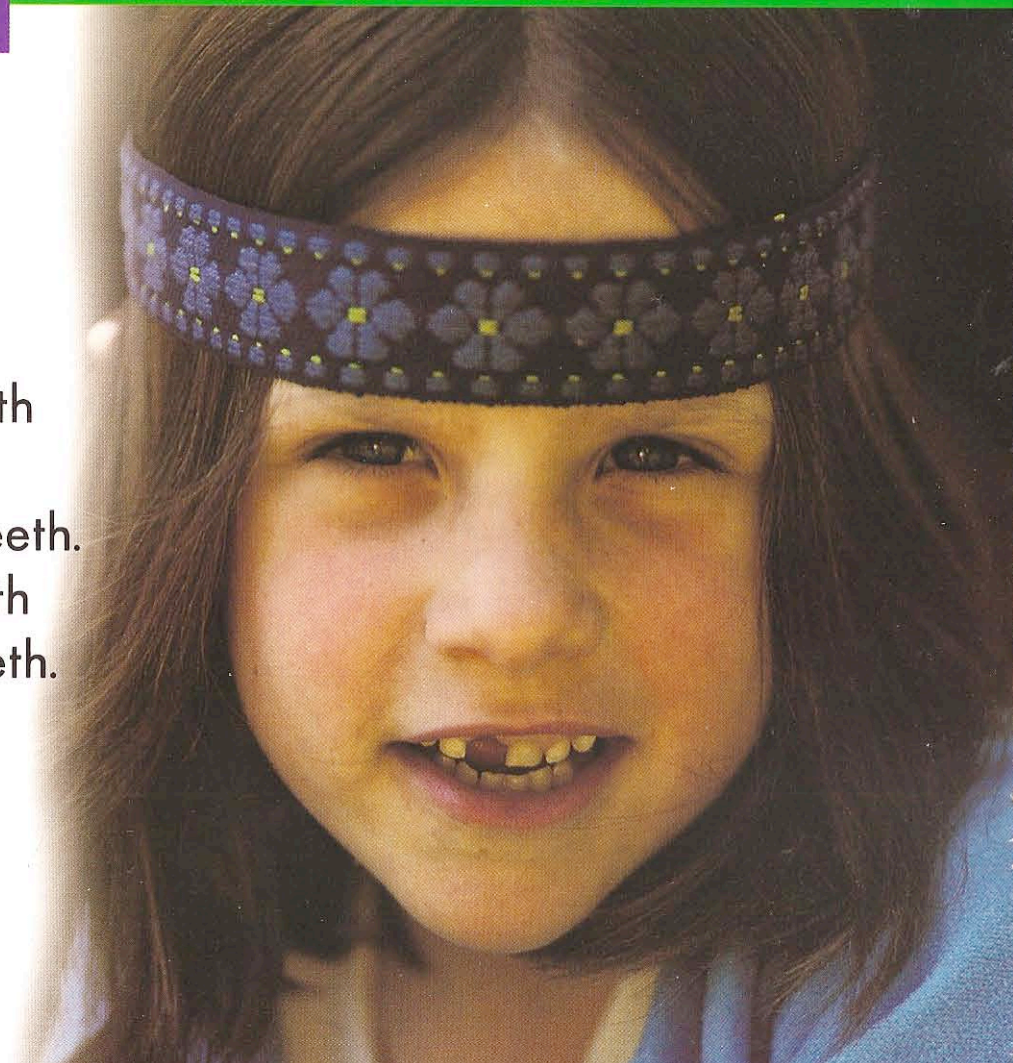
You see teeth like these every day. Just look in the mirror!

Does this scary hook look like a dragon's mouth?



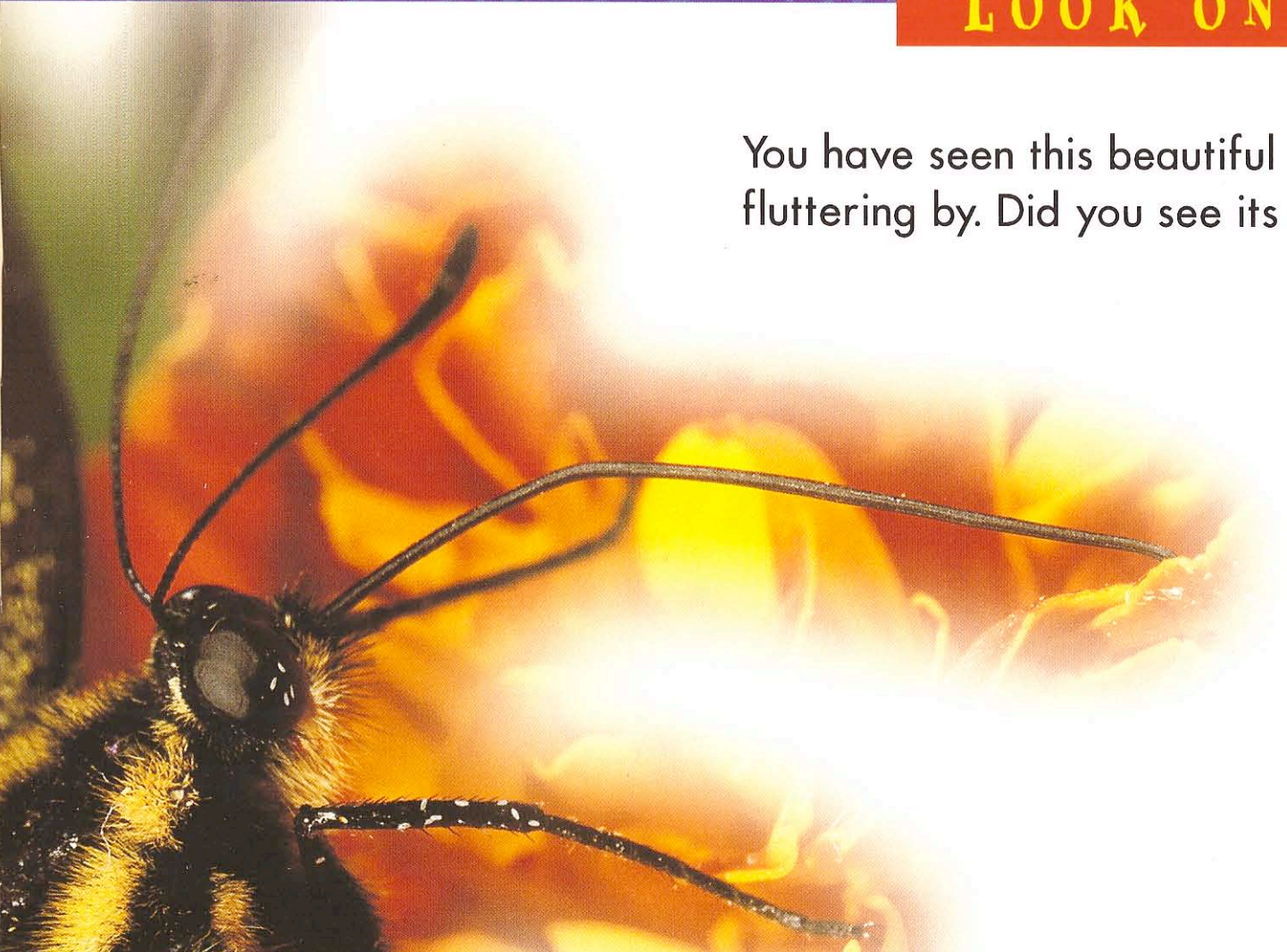
LOOK AGAIN

Young dragonflies are called nymphs. They do not fly. Instead, they live under water. A dragonfly nymph has a long lower lip. At the end of the lip are two sharp hooks. This nymph is eating a tadpole it caught with its hooks.



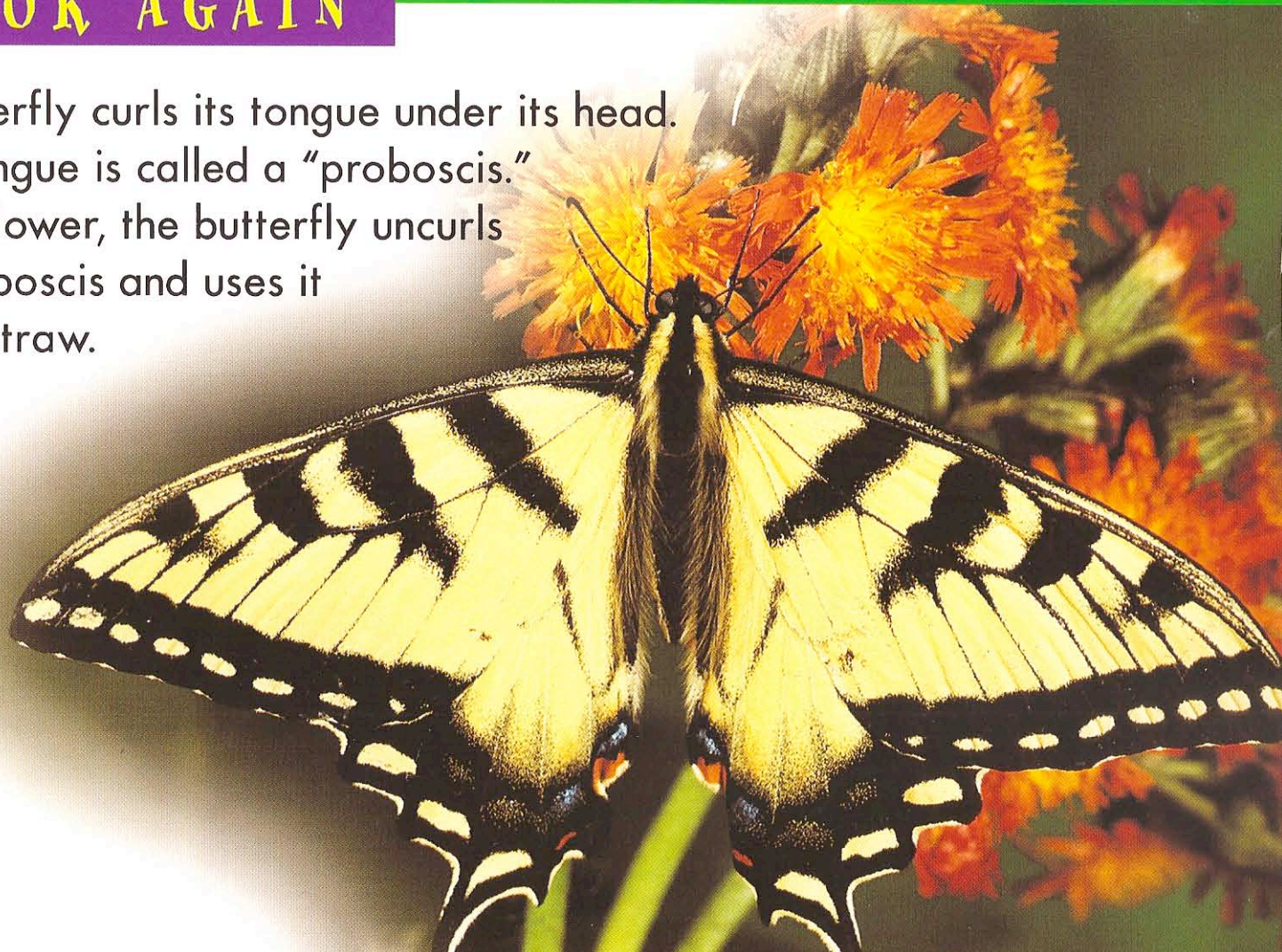
LOOK ONCE

You have seen this beautiful insect fluttering by. Did you see its mouth?



LOOK AGAIN

A butterfly curls its tongue under its head. The tongue is called a "proboscis." On a flower, the butterfly uncurls its proboscis and uses it like a straw.



LOOK ONCE

This animal is famous for changing colors.
It is also famous for its long, sticky tongue.



LOOK AGAIN

Chameleons are slow on their feet, but fast with their tongues. A chameleon's tongue is almost as long as its body. There is sticky mucus at the tip. The tongue shoots out faster than your eye can see. Zzzaap! The chameleon has its meal.



LOOK ONCE

Keep your fingers and toes
away from this mouth!



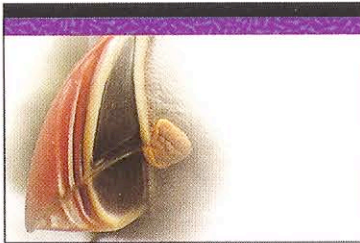
LOOK AGAIN

Alligators have sharp, pointed teeth. They are good for grabbing and tearing food, but not for chewing.

Alligators cannot chew their food. They swallow big chunks of food. They do not often bite people. But don't take any chances! This is a cousin of the alligator. It is called a caiman.

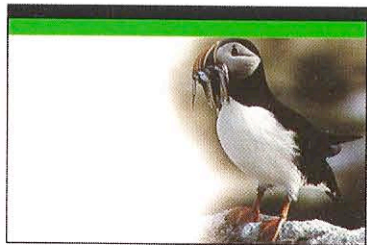

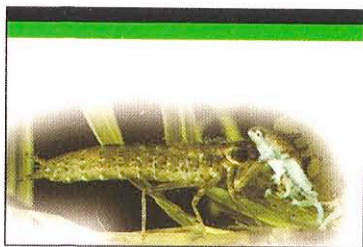

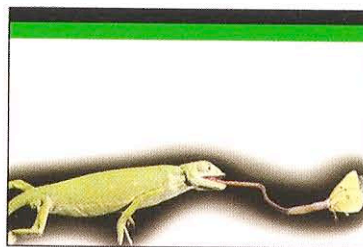
