The Thing From Mars

We did not know the terrible thing that was heading toward us through the darkness of space. It was already on its way, and it was getting nearer all the time.

One night I went for a walk with my wife. As we looked at the sky, I pointed out Mars to her. Many people were watching it and wondering what the flames might be. But we felt safe and had no thought of war.

Then came the night of the first falling flame. It was seen early in the morning, a line of green fire across the sky. I was writing near my window, yet I did not see this strange thing that came to Earth from space.

Ogilvy had seen the flame

and thought it was a meteorite. He got up early with the idea of finding it. Find it he did, in a deep hole it had made when it landed. The grass near it was on fire, and blue smoke climbed toward the sky.
