In Search of a Monster

Professor Aronnax had two opinions. The first one was that it was an enormous monster of great strength. His second opinion was that it was some sort of ship with enormous power.

The last idea brought many questions to his mind. Who could own such a machine? How could it be such a kept secret? Did some government own it? And for what reason? There were so many questions the professor could not answer.

When Professor Aronnax came to New York, people questioned him. He had written a book called "Mysteries of the Great Submarine Grounds." The professor was famous for being an expert in this field.

More and more people asked the professor for his opinion. He gave them this answer.

"The ocean deep is not known to us. We do not know of all the creatures that live there. I can only say that there must be a living creature in the sea that is at the bottom of this. It could be as long as sixty feet. With all its power and strength, the creature is doing much harm in our waters."

The professor's opinion was talked about widely. Because of his knowledge, his opinion was respected by many people.

The United States made plans to send out a large ship to find the creature. It was called the Abraham Lincoln. The Abraham Lincoln had been carefully picked for the voyage. It was a ship of great speed and great strength. The captain of the ship was Commander Farragut.

For two months no one heard of anything bad happening at sea. All was quiet. It was as if the monster knew it was being watched.

The Abraham Lincoln was set for its journey. But it did not know in which direction it should go. The monster could be anywhere in the world.

Three hours before the Abraham Lincoln was set to sail, Professor Aronnax received a letter. It was worded as follows:

Sir:

Will you join the Abraham Lincoln in our search for the great creature? The government of the United States will be happy to have you on our voyage. A cabin will be ready for you.

Up until he received the letter, Professor Aronnax longed to go home to France. He wanted to see his home, his country and his friends. But after reading the letter, all Professor Aronnax could think about was finding the sea creature. Finding it was to become his biggest wish in life.

So Professor Aronnax, with his trusted servant, Conseil, boarded the Abraham Lincoln. The ship set sail for the high seas. They were now in search of a great monster.
