When he took off his shirt and pants, I was startled to see that his entire body was covered with a wild pattern of tattoos. I stared at the markings on his

arms, hands, chest and legs. Even his face and bald head were decorated with painted shapes. I was amazed at his appearance. But, I knew that he was simply a human being like me. I soon found this stranger, named Queequeg, to be a good and kind person. We quickly became the best of friends.

Queequeg and I agreed to ship on the same whaler. On Monday, we sailed for Nantucket to find a worthy ship. Three ships docked at the pier were preparing to set sail on a whaling voyage. I studied each with great care. I finally settled on an old ship called the *Pequod*. This ship looked as if it had weathered many a storm. I climbed aboard to peer around for someone who might be in charge of signing men for the voyage. I found a man by the name of Captain Peleg. He told me he was one of the owners of the *Pequod*.

"And, who is captain of the *Pequod*, sir?" I asked. I thought it strange that the captain was not on board.

"That would be Captain Ahab," Peleg said.

"I'd like to meet him," I said.

Captain Peleg shook his head. "Ahab's a strange man. He keeps to his house and often will not even talk to me. He has only one leg, you see. He lost his leg to the great white whale. These days, he's often in a dark mood."
